7. Explanation of the Change:

The proposed modification entails two critical changes:

- 1. We are reducing the core major requirements from 18 credit hours to 15 credit hours; specifically, we are removing CJUS 431: Criminal Law as a core major requirement. This change lines up with the majority of criminal justice programs in the region as well as nationally, as it is rare for law courses to be required for criminal justice degree completion. These courses are typically offered as electives. We have instead moved CJUS 431: Criminal Law to the list of elective courses for the major.
- 2. We are eliminating the three emphases to accommodate current faculty teaching and research expertise as well as position our program to be more adaptable when additional faculty are added to the program/department. Most importantly, this change benefits students within the program. Since the inception of this major, several students have been unable to complete the emphases requirements in a timely fashion due to limits of course rotation. As a result, course substitutions have been required and granted. Though the emphases are eliminated, courses included in those areas have now been added as options in the list of program electives. To accommodate for the decrease in core credit hours for the major (due to the elimination of CJUS 431 within those requirements) as well as the decrease in credit hours that would have been earned through one of the emphases, we have increased the amount of required elective credits from 9 to 24.

These changes will eliminate the need for course substitutions, streamline the degree for majors, and facilitate a more straightforward approach for students when they work with Jani Kovach, our professional advisor, to design their academic plan.
